For the second year running, our school shadowed the Carnegie Book Award – the nation's oldest and most prestigious children's book award. The Carnegie Medal is awarded to a book of outstanding quality written for children and young people, and each year CILIP (the awarding body) invites libraries up and down the country to join the conversation and "shadow" the awards by reading and judging the shortlisted titles.

Over the past few months, our shadowing book club has met each week to discuss the nominated books (with juice and biscuits of course!) and share their thoughts on their favourites. The diversity of the shortlist means there really is something for everyone, and the book club offers a great opportunity to form new friendships, build confidence, and discover some of the best books that teen fiction has to offer.

We were delighted to see Ruta Sepetys's novel, *I Must Betray You*, take the Shadower's Choice award and our congratulations go to Manon Steffan Ros on winning the Carnegie Medal for Writing with *The Blue Book of Nebo*.



Our shadowing group thoroughly enjoyed taking part in the programme and we can't wait to do it again next year! If you'd like to take part, please speak to Mr Owens in the library. our pupils have produced. A huge well done to everyone involved!


If you didn't get a chance to see the published collection, a copy of *Read Between the Lines* is available to read in the library right now!

What book do you plan to read over the summer holidays? Neverwhere by Neil Gaiman


Which member of staff do you think has the most similar reading tastes to you? Mrs Moore




